

2,000 Abortions In Capital

Approximately 2,000 women seeking abortions in Sacramento County this year will be unable to afford them as a result of the legislature's decision to cut Medi-Cal abortion funds by \$23 million.

At Sacramento's three abortion clinics — Pregnancy Consultation Center, Planned Parenthood and Woodside Medical Center — women qualifying for Medi-Cal-funded abortions comprise from 35 to 50 percent of the clientele. Clinic personnel speculate of those women approximately one quarter simply have no other fi-

financial means for an abortion.

Last year there were 7,774 abortions reported in Sacramento County, approximately half of those were funded by Medi-Cal, according to state department of maternal and child health statistics.

Debra Bordisso, clinic coordinator for the Woodside clinic, said, "Those women just don't have any other recourse for payment."

She said a small percentage of the Medi-Cal patients using the clinic might be able to obtain funds from parents, sexual partners, or friends, or they might be able to obtain loans. However, she said, at least 25 percent

of the women coming to the clinic simply have no other financial means outside of Medi-Cal.

"What's going to happen is, up in the air, but as of August 15th (the date the new regulations take effect) is the end of Medi-Cal (patients) for us. I don't see any other way."

Thomas C. Kring, Planned Parenthood director, said he fears women will again turn to illegal abortions as a result of the narrowly-defined Medi-Cal regulations which were included in the state budget passed by

East Area Rapist Returns To Davis, Assaults Mother

DAVIS — A 33-year-old mother of two young sons was raped early Thursday by a man believed to be the East Area rapist, police reported.

This is the second attack within a month and the third Davis woman assaulted by a man who reportedly has raped 29 women and girls in Sacramento, Davis, Stockton and Modesto since 1975.

The latest victim lived in the Westwood subdivision five blocks from where a 33-year-old housewife was

attacked in the early morning hours of June 24. The Thursday victim also knew the woman assaulted on June 24, police said.

Davis police Sgt. Robert Persons said the woman, who is separated from her husband and lives with her sons, aged five and seven, was awakened about 3 a.m. by a man holding a flashlight in her face and waving a handgun. The rapist also had a knife. He menaced her, but did not cut her.

The intruder first told her all he wanted was money for gasoline. Per-
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State: Halt Ocean Oil Sale Plans

BURLINGAME (AP) — A lease sale for 3 million acres of offshore drilling sites off the California coast should be halted, the state Coastal Commission recommended Thursday.

The commission, which heard public testimony on offshore drilling sites from Point Conception to the Oregon border, voted 9-1 against the lease sale until "badly needed environmental studies are conducted."

The lease sale, to be conducted by the U.S. Department of Interior, is scheduled for February 1981.

More information is needed on the effect of oil drilling on marine resources before beginning the project, commission members said.

The commission also stressed that it isn't opposed to the development of oil and gas offshore, but feels that it is premature to plan for it without assuring that natural resources are protected.

The state's non-binding recommendations must be submitted to the federal agency today.

The commission also voted to submit a list of 29 areas that should be excluded from oil drilling. These areas include the Redwood National Park area, Point Reyes, Big Sur, the Monterey Bay Peninsula and the

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sons said, but he tied her hands behind her back and tied her feet. The man rummaged throughout the house and took about \$27 in cash and some postage stamps from a living room desk.

He returned to the woman and raped her once, and then went back prowling through the house, opening drawers and closets before leaving the residence about 4 a.m.

The victim was able to free her feet and ran to a neighbor's residence where her hands were untied and police were summoned. The two young boys failed to awake during the assault.

Persons said the man entered the house through a kitchen window after he took off a screen and punched a small hole in the glass to open the latch. Other doors and windows were locked.

He said the woman could not give a

description of the assailant because the house was dark, but added that similarities of the latest rape and other assaults by the East Area rapist leads him to believe it is the same man.

Sacramento authorities, who have been working on past assaults by the East Area rapist, went to Davis early Thursday to assist in the investigation.

Since the June 24th rape in Davis and a rape on June 7 of a 21-year-old student in an apartment complex on the north side of the University of California at Davis, local hardware stores have sold out of locks for windows and doors.

Tom Haley, manager of the Davis Lumber and Hardware Co., said he has sold "somewhere around 500 locks" since the June 24 attack. He said he has ordered a new stock but expects it to be sold out in a few days.

Haley said 90 percent of the purchasers of locks said they feared an attack by the East Area rapist.

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that he would comply with the order if it is upheld on appeal. If it is decided that the government has no lawful alternative to the release of the files, he said, "I will, of course, comply."

But, he continued, to do so now would violate his oath of office and "seriously impair" the government's relationship with its domestic law enforcement and foreign counterintelligence informants.

In serving final notice last Friday on Bell to comply, Griesa, who has been a federal judge since 1972, said he could not accept the attorney general's position "that it would be a grave step to hold a cabinet officer in contempt of court for failure to comply with a discovery order."

"No one can deny," Griesa said, "it is a grave step to enforce such an order."

Woman Tries Soft Sell With A Handy Banana

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — An Annapolis woman has been charged with assaulting a police officer with a banana after she refused to pay a \$1.25 toll on the Chesapeake Bay Bridge.

Authorities said Kathleen Wechsler, 31, hit Bay Bridge Police Officer Thomas R. Crouch with the fruit after she allegedly rammed his cruiser with her car when he tried to stop her near a toll plaza on the western end of the twin span.

Ms. Wechsler then slipped back into her car and drove off, leading police on a high-speed chase for about five miles before she was caught, authorities said.
